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Activist Judges Strike Again Radically Redefining Marriage In Connecticut!

Trenton- The New Jersey Family Policy Council and New Jersey Family First, its legislative advocacy arm expressed great concern over the Connecticut Supreme Court's decision radically redefining marriage for the residents of that State and called it another example of judicial activism seeing rights never intended in that State's Constitution. The NJ Family Policy Council believes this ruling is unjust, outrageous and is out of mainstream thought of the people of Connecticut as it forces the people of Connecticut the task of over turning this ruling through constitutional means.

The outcome of this case reinforces the statement made by Len Deo, President of the New Jersey Family Policy Council. "Advocates for same-sex 'marriage' do not like the democratic process of going through the legislature, that's why they file lawsuits instead of introducing legislation."

"The legislature is the body that should set social policy and approve laws for the people it represents and the judiciary should interpret the law," Len Deo stated. "We wish the people of Connecticut who support the time tested definition of marriage as being the union between one man and one woman great success in their efforts to over rule this judicial activism and take back the proper role that belongs to the people. The elimination of one gender from marriage is not a mere expansion of an institution, but rather the destruction of a core principle of society. The Connecticut Court got it wrong and the people need to take back what is properly theirs in this continuing battle," Deo added.

Here in New Jersey, the fact that same sex "marriage" proponents continue to push for marriage legalization after the legislature enacted a civil union law for those who cannot get married shows the unprecedented desire of these activists to eradicate the very foundation of marriage.

"New Jersey Legislators need to understand that this issue will not go away until either marriage is protected or it is radically redefined. This should not be a partisan issue and I believe that both political parties coming together is a good first step in working for the majority of New Jerseyans who support marriage to remain as the union of one man and one woman," Deo concluded.
